### The Please Give Me Game

Place all the flashcards around the room for your child to collect. Then ask for them back using simple sentences e.g. "Please give me a rocket".

### The Vanishing Flashcards Game

Place a number of flashcards in front of your child. Give them a few moments to memorize the pictures and then tell them to close their eyes. Take away one of the flashcards and then tell them to open their eyes again and tell you which one is missing.

### The Cross the River Game

Place flashcards on floor in winding manner. Each represents a stepping stone in the river, your child must say the word in order to step on it and cross the river.

### The Concentration Game

You need 2 sets of flashcards for this game. Place both sets face down on the floor. Ask your child to turn over 2 cards (saying the cards aloud). If the cards match then they can keep the cards. If the cards are different the cards are turned back over again in their original places.

### The Guessing Question Game

This is good practice for asking simple questions. Hide a flash card behind your back and your child will try to guess what the object is by asking questions: "Is it a dog?", "Is it a ball?", "Is it a book?", etc. until they guess the flashcard.

### The Sight Word Hide-and-Seek Game

Begin with a few simple words, no more than three. Show your child the words and review them. Encourage your child to say the words while you quickly place the words in visible areas of the room. Then, call out the first word and wait while your child inspects each word to find the appropriate card.
